



Transforming tenants into owners



Model Cities is working to develop a housing model of community ownership in Frogtown.

Through a partnership with the Frogtown Neighborhood Association (FNA), Hope Community, Historic Saint Paul, and the Housing Justice Center, Model Cities began work on a development project known as, "The Sherburne Collective."

The project will convert a vacant eight-unit apartment building into six units of community housing that will be available for members of the Frogtown/Rondo neighborhoods to reside in and eventually own.



Through extensive engagement with the community members and former residents of the building, the "Collective" will determine what ownership model will work best to meet the goal of community ownership of this building. The overall goal of the project is to preserve a valuable housing resource in the neighborhood, while preventing displacement and providing an opportunity for residents to build generational wealth.

Drive for reparations

Pilgrim Lutheran Church celebrates its 100-year anniversary by supporting Model Cities.

In 1924, a Black couple moved into a predominately white neighborhood near the newly formed Pilgrim Lutheran Church. William Francis was an attorney and civil rights advocate. Nellie Griswold Francis authored the Minnesota anti-lynching bill that became law in 1921. Despite their efforts to work for racial equality, they experienced prejudices in their new neighborhood. Threats and harassment eventually caused them to sell their home and leave Saint Paul.

To honor the memory of Nellie and William
Francis and affirm their commitment to an
ongoing process of becoming anti-racist,
Pilgrim Lutheran Church's congregation
made an Anniversary gift to Model Cities in
support of home ownership for Black families.
Model Cities offers thanks to the Pilgrim
community for elevating the story of William
and Nellie, acknowledging the harm that was
caused, and for their renewed promise to work
collectively with Black Indigenous People of Color
to right this wrong.

By the numbers

The impact and outcomes of 2021 illustrate how we provide access and opportunities to individuals, families, and communities.

164

164 households served through Homebuyer Services. 62 households participated in homebuyer education (HomeStretch) and 102 households received one-on-one pre-purchase counseling.

9,600

9,600 meals served to Safe Space shelter guests through partnerships and volunteer efforts.

1,928

1,928 shelter guests utilized Safe Space and 107 individuals received assistance through our Day Services Shelter program.

103

103 adults and children served by Sankofa and Families First Supportive Housing programs providing education, training, and vital housing assistance, including furniture and rental assistance.

\$61,263

Model Cities aided 22 families in receiving back rent and electric bill assistance through the MN Rent Help program, adding up to \$61,263 in total support.

37

Youth Services supported 37 youth and their families in building healthy relationships, providing access to opportunities, and teaching life and work-readiness skills needed for positive development.

272

272 youth served through United Way's Action Day. Youth from Model Cities' Supportive Housing, Community Coaching, Family Coaching, and commercial tenants received backpacks.

2,402

2,402 individuals served agency-wide in 2021. 66% BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) and 76% people living in poverty, which helped reduce racial and economic disparities.
